Models, Approaches and Tools

- Different names similar objectives
 - Human/Nature balance
 - Larger scales
 - Integration of economics, governance, environment
 - Many are responses to failings of Integrated Conservation and Development Projects (ICDPs) in the 1990s
- Approaches with different emphases:
 - Spatial (landscapes and seascape)
 - Ecological units (ecosystems)
 - Economics (Payments for Ecosystem Services)
 - Multi-Sectoral (Nature, Wealth & Power)



Landscape and Seascape Approaches



- Key feature: Broad geographical units
- Strength: Improved opportunities for addressing community development and livelihoods
- Challenge: Significant planning process and data needs








Ecosystems and Watersheds



- Key feature: natural linkages and ecological system dynamics
- Strength: helps forge linkages among people dependent on specific resources and services
- Challenge: negotiating trade-offs across vested interested groups can be difficult and time-consuming








Economic Approaches



- Key feature: financial incentives
- Strength: tangible benefits
- Challenges: scaling up to achieve sustainability can be tough and economic incentives can be fickle







Nature, Wealth & Power



- Key feature: improved management by transferring rights and responsibilities to users
- Strength: explicit links between conservation, good governance and improved livelihoods
- Challenge: Addressing rights/authorities and resource tenure is complicated



Nature

Sustainable natural resource management and increased productivity; environmental rehabilitation and recovery



Crosscutting Themes

- Policy and legal reform
- Capacity building
- Organizational development
- Competitiveness/links
- Knowledge management
- Integration

Power

Greater local control, access, and responsibility over resources; greater equity; empowered citizenry; robust systems of accountability and representativity, increased freedom

Wealth

Sustainable rates of rural economic growth and alleviation of rural poverty



To Summarize...
