


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Geographical context and location for interventions

Objectives

- ➤ Improve management of shared wildlife resources through harmonized policy and legal frameworks
- ➤ Facilitate establishment of SMART community, public and private sector partnerships (CPPPs) for tourism development
- ➤ Enhance ecosystem integrity and connectivity at a 'trans-frontier landscape level'
- Develop frameworks and strategies that provide for co-management
- ➤ Promote the marketing of the trans-frontier landscapes as viable tourism destinations





Results and Lessons Learnt

Results

- •Tentative boundaries to secure >1.5 million hectares set
- •TFCA concepts shared and accepted by multi-stakeholder groups
- •Pilot community based cultural tourism and commercial fishing enterprises initiated
- •General Management Plans for Mana Pools & Lower Zambezi NPs completed as anchors and basis for improved management for approx. 600,000 ha
- •Trans-frontier wildlife population monitoring and assessments using standard methods conducted to inform harmonization of policy frameworks

Lessons learnt

- •TFCAs promote multi-land use and multi-stakeholder participation that result in high probability of contributing to biodiversity conservation and poverty alleviation
- •Functional community NR governance institutions are needed for realistic and genuine community participation
- •Gov't sensitization needed as they tend to maintain sovereignty OVER regionalism, thereby stifling implementation of trans-frontier programs
